Sacraments of Vocation: Holy Orders & Matrimony Class Overview

To this end, we will be exploring the Sacraments of Vocation as conduits of grace that transform the very nature of our hearts so that we can then bring the light of Christ to a world that has lost its way.

Three ministry reflections have been provided to help center your hearts in gratitude, hope and charity that I hope you will embrace as you prepare for the time we will spend together.

Also, there is a homework assignment that can be completed before or after the class as there are benefits to both approaches and, given where you are at in your formation and state of life, I feel confident that you can do this.

Introduction & Opening Prayer

Holy Orders:

Our reflection on the Sacrament of Orders will briefly touch upon how the ordained ministry of the Church serves not only the People of God but all peoples and nations and then, in small groups, we will explore expectations of the ordained clergy as it affects lay ministry. Presentation topics include the following:

- Theology of Orders
- Threefold order of Ordained Ministry: Bishop, Deacon, and Priest
- Call to Orders and Ordination
- Service of Charity and Mercy

Holy Orders

Matrimony

Paragraphs 1601-1666 in the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u> focuses on Matrimony—about sixteen pages—and it would be great if you have a chance to read through this section however only the following paragraphs are assigned:

Sacraments of Vocation: Homework Assignment

Dr. Luke Timothy Johnson is a well known scholar and theologian who has taken the letters of St. Paul and summarized St. Paul's understanding of faith as follows:

Faith is not belief. Faith includes belief but it is much more. Faith is a gift from God--who created us and has claim to us--that calls for a person's living response to God in love, gratitude, obedience, fidelity, trust, and belief that Jesus is Lord.*

In one or two paragraphs describe how you see a sacramental marriage as a reflection of this understanding of faith.
